The Witches Reel began our warm up to the music of Caddam Wood. Imagine witches swirling about the trees in misty dark forest, slipping through the trees, and threading a needle (arch) formed by the top men, then top ladies.

Then 5 dancers made up 3-couple longwise sets – where the third woman was missing! The dance was The Ghost and Mary Jo and involved shadow reels across with a lead change on last 2 bars of the reel to move into another reel on the side. What a neat dance!! The music Cheryl chose was The Slinky.

We moved along through Slytherin House (music of the same name) which ends with sixteen bars of the Serpentine figure as the dancers move from hands across to a chase. We have enjoyed this dance from Chris Ronald before.

A Reel Question

The dance *Fair Donald* was taught in the Thursday class earlier in November, and Lynn noticed a relationship with the dance *Macdonald of the Isles*: both dances have the name Donald in the title, and the distinctive diagonal reels of four in the instructions. She wondered if this was just by chance? Doug suggested this could be researched, and any answer published in the L&A.

Macdonald of the Isles is a relatively modern dance, written by Derek Haynes and published by him in 1966, and *Fair Donald* was published by the RSCDS in Book 29, in 1979, with no source being given. Usually, if an RSCDS dance comes from an old collection, that is acknowledged, but I could find no such acknowledgment in this case, which makes one wonder.

It is fairly common for a teacher wanting a dance with particular formations, not being aware of one in published sources, to simply invent one. I've certainly done it. Such dances are not usually published, but could that explain the origin of *Fair Donald?* We'll probably never know.

There are two Donalds attending the class. More coincidence?

More on the cruise theme!

Cheryl found a book – The Vienna Book of SCD - at summer school some years ago and liked the dance Trip to Vienna. This dance is a 40-bar Strathspey, a bit unusual which keeps us thinking "What? There's one more figure?"

The figures of the dance signify specific places to visit in Vienna. They include:

a **circle** representing the circular road around the centre of the city known as the Ring;

a **promenade** representing the people strolling in parks or castle grounds or gardens;

a **lead up** by third couple representing the spire of St. Stephen's Cathedral;

a **rondel** representing the Big Wheel in the amusement park known as the Prater; and

a **poussette** right round representing the Viennese waltzes.



Step Dance Class

I have had questions about the Step Dance class and thought I should put the information about the class in writing.

The Scottish Step dancing that I will be teaching is a soft shoe version of "Traditional Scottish Ladies Step Dancing" that has been danced for hundreds of years. There are many modern dances that have been devised for solo performance, and small group performances that include ladies and men.

The steps that are used include some Highland, Scottish Country and Ballet type movements.

The soft shoe step class would be for dancers who are competent with Scottish Country dance steps.

There is only one class scheduled at this time Sunday January 11, 2026 starting at 7 pm at CPUC. Dancers can try the class and if there is a consensus to continue we will then plan for future classes on a monthly basis.
