A Word from the Chair of COM

The announcement was a shock, but perhaps not unexpected, when on Friday 9th April, we heard the news: “It is with deep sorrow that Her Majesty The Queen announces the death of her beloved husband, His Royal Highness The Prince Philip Duke of Edinburgh. His Royal Highness passed away peacefully this morning at Windsor Castle. Further announcements will made in due course. The Royal Family join with people around the world in mourning his loss.”

Many in our Branch will be counted in that number who are mourning his passing and some of us might have our own Prince Philip stories.

My only experience of him was during my time as a piper with the Queen’s Own Cameron Highlanders. Philip was visiting Winnipeg and our regiment was providing the guard at Government House. It was a cold October afternoon and the band was keeping warm in

the garage. An officer raced in to tell us Philip was early and they were holding his car at the entrance to Government House. We quickly assembled ourselves at the appointed spot and hoped our pipes were still in tune. His car approached and then the ceremonial inspection began. Philip was led through the ranks and every so often spoke to someone or other. Philip had a keen eye and I remember his eyes meeting mine as he surveyed the band. I would not have wanted him to find fault with my uniform.

He also had a sharp sense of humour. At the time of his visit, the band was eagerly waiting for new green doublets (jackets) because our existing ones (World War II era) were literally falling apart. Since new doublets were expected at any time, no one bothered to repair what we had. During the inspection, the time came for the Pipe Major to salute His Royal Highness. In raising his right arm in salute, Prince Philip could see that almost the entire sleeve was torn, exposing the lining. With his usual wit, Philip said to the embarrassed Pipe Major: "I see they make these jackets to last".

The story is told of a visit Philip made to the RSCDS headquarters in Edinburgh in the early 1960s. Miss Milligan was showing him a map of the world, which had pins marking each branch location. Philip saw this broad expanse of the prairies with no pins and he asked why there were no branches identified. With justifiable pride Miss Milligan informed His Royal Highness that a new branch was just about to be formed in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

Let's conclude this remembrance of Prince Philip with this prayer from the United Church of Canada.

"Loving God, in this muted Eastertide, when we celebrate symbols of new life, hope, and resurrection amidst a global pandemic, we mourn the death of His Royal Highness, Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, while celebrating the love His Royal Highness shared during his long life of public service.

We are especially grateful for the ways His Royal Highness worked to empower young people, and for the continued legacy of The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award.

Every Eastertide, we are reminded that nothing, neither life nor death, can separate us from your love, and the love that we share with each other.

With this assurance, we commend His Royal Highness's passion to our hearts, and extend our prayers to the Queen, the other members of the Royal Family, and all who knew and loved the Duke of Edinburgh. Amen."

Until we meet again, take care, stay healthy, wear your RSCDS mask, and may the blessings of this season of joy and hope be with you.

We’ve Moved!!!

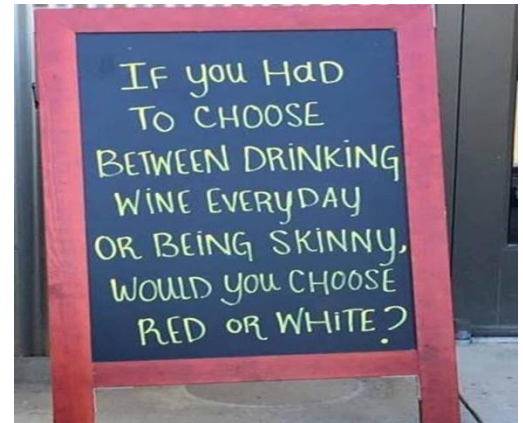

John Bowie

John Bowie passed away on Feb 11, 2021, age 87, in Courtney BC, following a brief illness. He was predeceased by his wife Margaret Feb 16, 2012.

John immigrated from Dundee to Toronto in 1949, working in the financial field, and moved to Montreal a few years later. There he joined a church choir and met Margaret Gibson, a fellow Scot, and the soprano soloist of The Church of Andrew and St Paul. So they met, married, and moved to Vancouver.

In 1966, they moved to Winnipeg and joined Knox Church (which is where all our classes took place) and Margaret was again a soprano soloist. The best part for us was that they were both dancers, and Margaret an RSCDS teacher, and that they joined the Branch.

They were known by some as the dynamic duo. Margaret was the dreamer and visionary, John was the facilitator, and it all worked out well. They started, for the Branch, Dancing in the Park, the float for the summer parades, a proper Demonstration Class, but most of all, Mug Pub.



John and Margaret left Winnipeg in 1972 to follow another dream - a restaurant in Comox, BC. Many Branch members never met this duo, but do know them by reputation.

John's ashes will be interred beside his beloved wife Margaret in the Mount Royal Cemetery, The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Montreal.
