Class Notes

Tuesday Technique Class

To start the month Cheryl was back at the helm and piloted us through some challenging waters. One hazard she navigated us through was the Tourbillon, which when translated into English means a whirlwind, swirl or eddy. I could see how this strathspey figure could be described as swirly. The tourbillon is part of the dance entitled "Spirit of the Dance". My scottish country dancing muse, (who

shall remain anonymous), recalled that she had done the tourbillon 15 years ago and it was traumatic. Perhaps her observation propped up her all encompassing pronouncement that Scottish country dancing is humbling – a generality supported by other experienced dancers – no matter how long you have been dancing, you can still make an awful mess of it. Anyway, many of us benefitted from some gentle instruction in the tourbillon and 3 couple rights and lefts. Cheryl also introduced us to the kiwi knot as a formation appearing in the dance, "The Celtic Kiwi" - a genuinely fun and noteworthy dance composed by John Dewry. Another composition by John Dewry which we danced on a couple of evenings was "The Lap-top Dancer and the Stripper" devised as a result of frustration with his computer. It is a busy dance, and when attempted with some confusion on our last evening, the comment was made that sometimes when things go wrong you just have to hit "ctrl, alt, delete". Sheila, our instructor on March 26^{th,} she led us through some of the dances from the April social. She attempted to refine our performance of the knot for the dance "Annie Douglas". Thank you, Sheila, for reviewing J. B. Milne. Dancing it is much better than trying to figure it out by reading the crib notes. Names appear frequently as titles for dances and there must be a story behind them. In fact all three of the dances that Sheila presented were so named. Peter reminded me to read the extensive background behind J.B.Milne as given in strathspey.org. He lived from 1902 to 1968 and is remembered in Scotland for the cinema empire he built up. When he died he controlled 34 cinemas and bingo halls. Another interesting dance this month was "The Hamilton Welcome" - A very neat dance for 5 couples. A reel is danced starting from positions 1,3,5 with 2 and 4 standing still. The Hamilton Welcome breaks from the usual 'twice and to the bottom" scenario. The dancing couple ends in 5th place by virtue of the dance pattern has to start into reflection reels right away – so lots of fun, but no time to nap. Cheryl, Sheila and Maureen took turns to shepherd us through the last class of the term. All the dances proved to be a little different from the usual. After a week spent visiting her daughters, Cheryl chose Smiling Lila, a dance she had learned while attending a dance class in Toronto. Don Barton wrote this dance for his granddaughter and insisted that it be danced to music he wrote. The sheet music of the same name is available at the Scottish country dancing dictionary. Maureen led us through Trip to Bavaria - distinctive in that the dancing never stops! Sheila guided us through Miss Johnstone of Ardrossan – a clever dance for a 5 couple set. This reel was dedicated to the musician Muriel Johnstone, who grew up in Ardrossan on the North Ayrshire coast. As the Tuesday evening dancers sat around a table of goodies, Cheryl, along with Sheila and Maureen who occasionally filled in for her, were thanked for providing us with instructive and entertaining dances during the second term.
