Class Notes

Fort Garry Social (Monday)

The Fort Garry Class will hold a make-up class (re Thanksgiving cancellation) on Monday 19 December. As this is the last class of the term, we will have refreshments after the dancing. We invite all members who are free on that evening to join us, and if you have a bit of holiday baking to share, that will be welcome.

Technique (Tuesday)

We've had an interesting and challenging month. We usually have 14-16 dancers, and as usual, Cheryl found dances "off the beaten track" to make us think, as well as making us use good technique. Notable were Borders Traditional, with a variation on the usual quick time poussette, In the Clover, which involved three couples in an unusual triangular formation, and Mennie Hands Around, actually written by Cheryl herself, in memory of her mother.

A notable formation that we encountered was the Schiehallion reel. I was sufficiently interested to seek out information about the name. The original dance Schiehallion is a medley of stratshspey and reel, and I found this in the SCD dictionary: "This Schiehallion dance depicts the slow steady climb to get to the top of the mountain in the first part with the strathspey step, and the faster descent with the reel in the second part." The mountain, in question, is 'Sidh Chailleann' a conical mountain (peak elevation 1083 m) in Perthshire very popular with hikers. The name means "Fairy Hill of the Caledonians'. The rocks of this mountain were originally shallow oceanic sand and sandstone prior to the closing of the Atlantic Ocean 490 - 400 million years ago due to continental drift. With the collision of the North American plate the sandstones were buried deep and greatly deformed and metamorphosed to quartzite and thrust into a high and complex mountain chain. When the Atlantic Ocean opened again it left the Caledonian mountains on the European side and Acadia and the Appalachians on the North American side. Several glacial advances greatly eroded and sculpted these mountains to the roots that remain for present day hikers and dancers.

The class hosted the first Branch social of the season on November 29. We had 16 – 18 couples, and nine dances, with some easier ones to start and finish, and some challenges in the middle. Speaking of challenges, I might mention Gates of Edinburgh. For some reason we just did not execute that dance. Or, rather, we did execute it! Still, it was a fun night.

We were sorry to miss class due to weather on December 6; now we hope that Cheryl and Doug can dig themselves out to make it to their flight to NY on December 9, and we look forward to next term.

Scottish Country Dancing in California

Jan MacPhail and I had a fabulous trip to San Francisco and the Monterey Peninsula. Having an interest in attending an out of town workshop, Asilomar seemed to fit the bill - a gorgeous setting on the Pacific, excellent teachers and a large number of dancers from round the world. Being relatively close to San Francisco meant we could explore this famous city as well.

We started out with a bang by being picked up at our hotel by Laura and Paul Bennett who drove us through the scenic parts of San Francisco, across the Golden Gate Bridge, through beautiful countryside, past Silicon Valley and en route treated to us to a fabulous oceanside lunch in the famous village of Capitola, where we saw seals and various wonderful birds. Upon arrival at Asilomar, we discovered a seaside version of Jasper Park Lodge with beautiful assorted buildings for dining, conferencing, i.e. dance classes, accommodations and a magnificent ballroom around a welcoming administration center.

The weekend started with a great casual dinner, a super friendly welcome dance followed by an incredible ceilidh and a lavish reception. Saturday AM consisted of classes (Advanced Social for us) with the teaching of Andrew Smith and Sara Gratiot. This class suited us really well and the warmups were especially fun and the teaching was very stimulating. After lunch, more classes for ball prep/review and a teachers' reception for Joyce! After dinner and a quick change into our ball gowns we were off to the Masquerade Ball, the truly grand Grand March with 250+ people transitioning smoothly into the 1st dance. To be part of so many masked dancers dressed in elegant ball gowns and in fine highland dress was a thrill, especially dancing to the music of Tullochgorm, the SCD band based in Boston. A truly wonderful night!

Sunday morning and one last hurrah allowed all the participants and teachers to dance to the combined music provided by all class musicians and band members. What a great way to end the dancing before a quick goodbye lunch to all our new friends. So back to San Francisco with Jeanne Sole, a SF dancer, who very kindly drove us right to our hotel, stopping at a well known spot viewing seal lions, sea otters and many sea birds.

What fun we had exploring San Francisco - riding the cable car down to Fisherman's Wharf, exploring the waterfront and enjoying famous sourdough sandwiches on the patio at Boudin's. An open air bus took us over the Golden Gate Bridge, we walked the grounds of the famous Art Institute and passed through upscale area of Pacific Heights with such residents as Nancy Pelosi and Mrs Doubtfire.

We ate at the Cheesecake Factory made famous by the Big BangTheory, walked up and down the streets of SF (literally) as it is very hilly! through famous Chinatown (many times), up Nob Hill to the Fairmont with its fine statue of Tony Bennett, singing "I Left Mt Heart in San Francisco", across from the "Top of the Mark" Hopkins Hotel, climbed up and down the Crooked Street, viewed the Painted Ladies Houses of Full House fame and with a beautiful view of the Bay, took the Bawdy and Naughty Tour and learned about the importance of the ladies to the "mining industry" in the late 1800's. One of best deals was riding a city bus to Cliff House, the most western point of North America, for \$1.00 with a transfer that should have expired after 90 minutes but the driver couldn't be bothered to check the transfer.

The trip would not have been complete without a tour to California wineries. We were picked up by a Bordello-like stretch vehicle, were served mimosas and a 2nd breakfast and drove towards the wine country of Sonoma and Napa Valley. Visited and sampled wine at four wineries and were served a sumptuous lunch. A great day!

The highlights other than the dancing weekend were the happy hour wine and cheese receptions at our hotel from 5: 00 to 6:30 (or later), the delicious meals and the very friendly and helpful people we met.

• Have you ever considered taking the RSCDS Teaching Certificate but are not sure if your technique is good enough?

If you answered yes to any of these questions then the Dance Achievement Award Test is the class for you. Join us at the TAC Summer School in Vancouver, British Columbia and attend an intermediate DAA course next July. The class will run for three afternoons followed by the assessment on Friday afternoon.

Participants are expected to know the six prescribed dances prior to arrival so that they can concentrate on "polishing the finer points of their performance" while working together as a team.

You do not need to be a member of the RSCDS and this opportunity is open to any dancer.
