Presentation of Life Membership to Maureen Burnham by Cheryl Durnin April 21, 2018

This evening, as has been done occasionally in the past, we would like to take a moment or two to honour a branch member who has contributed greatly to the life and work of our branch.

This individual has been very active in the branch for many years and has worn many hats. But the most famous and most recognizable hat is that of Mrs. Mop. That hat should be enshrined.



Maureen Burnham, aka Mrs. Mop, started her dancing at the Winnipeg General Hospital while working the night shift. Her nursing partner, Jean Highmoor, taught Maureen skip change of step. While doing rounds and checking on their patients Jean took one side of the ward and Maureen the other. Together

they would skip change of step from one patient to the next, meet at the end, and skip change back to the top of the ward.

Maureen joined the Winnipeg branch in the late 60's. Soon after, she was invited to join the demonstration team under the guidance of Margaret Zadworny. Her dancing partner quite often was Charlie Inglis. Rehearsals were held on Saturday afternoons from 2-4 pm. Then all went to the Salisbury House on Ellice Ave. for burgers. They worked very hard on the dancing which was top notch and the group had many enjoyable social times together. Each summer the Team danced on the RSCDS float at several parades including Charleswood In Motion Days and the long Red River Ex parade to the piping of Doug Will who was the branch piper. I am sure they all had a few blisters after dancing on a moving, bouncy, carpeted float.

Maureen gained her prelim teaching certificate in Scotland and completed her full certificate in Winnipeg at Knox Church in 1975, having to teach Triumph, under the watchful eye of Miss Milligan. And as I understand, Miss Milligan saw something in the class and took over Maureen's time with the class to make her own point known. I can only imagine the fear of then standing in front of Miss Milligan awaiting critique and wondering if you would pass or not.

Maureen went on 2 Bob Blackie trips back in the day. One trip was to Hawaii and the other to Barbados.

Did you know she is a champion dancer? On one of the Bob Blackie trips Maureen and her partner won the Jive competition, and for her efforts, won a bottle of rum.

At one of the many ceilidhs in Winnipeg, Maureen and Charlie Inglis premiered the one eyed yellow idol of Katmandu and it is still being perfected with her new partner Ron who is a little too tall for the part.

How many remember the ceilidh in Winnipeg with her sing along.... Complete with song sheets... of cowboy songs.

A number of years ago at one of our workshops a guest teacher informed us he was not coming..... on the Fridaythe start of the workshop. Robin Lynch was the teacher rep on that workshop committee and phoned Maureen and asked her "Guess who's teaching our workshop?" Then she proceeded to inform Maureen, "You are". Maureen, you did a great job teaching that weekend. On Sunday morning you taught Neidpath Castle. I remember how well we all danced that dance, and to this day it is still one of my favourites.

Teachers Association Canada (TAC) was always a highlight for Maureen. It was an opportunity to get together with teachers from then around Canada to share stories and discuss pertinent issues related to SCD in their home groups. This helped with the continuity of how dance formations were to be danced and perfected. This was long before the days of internet and You tube. So getting together for a weekend once a year was The Only Way to learn and share. What was learned was then taken back to the local groups and shared with the local teachers so all the classes would gain from this knowledge. This was also the time for the AGM where issues were discussed that helped bridge the gap between headquarters and local groups. They were the voice for North America in the beginning but now stretch around the globe.

TAC members for many years were assisted to their room after the parties on "The Bus" - a hotel luggage cart. Maureen and Robin Lynch were in charge and drove the bus. They would run the bus up and down the hallway; Bob Blackie was the able brakeman. They drove members to their rooms and took their job very seriously. No DUI (that's dancing under the influence) under their DD service. I have

heard some of the riders were terrified as they went at break neck speeds. Maureen and Robin on the front providing the power and speed, then the call would come BRAKE....Bob probably wore out a pair of shoes each night as he dug in his heels at the back of the bus to ensure it stopped before careening into the wall at the end of the hallway. No TAC AGM was ever complete without Maureen adjourning the meeting. Even last year a comment was made at the AGM that Maureen was not there to adjourn us all. As the current teacher rep for Winnipeg, I wasn't sure if I could adjourn on her behalf or not. "A big responsibility that would have been."

As an aside, Maureen's daughter Sydney danced in the Children's class and carried the haggis at a Burn's dinner one year.

Over the many years that Maureen has been a member of our branch she has strived to uphold the standards as set out by the RSCDS with her own dancing, and with her teaching. She has taught at all levels from Beginners to Advanced and everything in between including a children's class. She has been an active teacher rep on the COM throughout the years and because of her many years in the branch has been a valuable resource regarding what happened in the branch and when, as well as what should be happening and when.

And Mug Pub would not have been complete without Mrs. Mop.

At some point she coined the phrase "You're going to have fun whether you like it or not"

So, Maureen it gives me great pleasure in asking you to come forward and accept this life membership to the Winnipeg Branch in recognition of all that you have contributed to SCD in Winnipeg and I say to you "You're now going to come up and have fun whether you like it or not"

We, of course, were advertising our upcoming workshop, and were quite surprised when, later in the autumn, we had correspondence from Mieko indicating that she was interested in coming. We kept in touch about the details, and, as you know, she did come.

Initially, she had planned to come just for the weekend. We persuaded her to add a few days, and to stay with us. We could tell that she was a bit concerned about having dogs in the house - she had no experience with that. We sent photos, and did our best to give her the idea of waiting for them to approach, and it all went very well. A few words from a letter she left with us: "... I like Maggy and Jessy. They are calm and gentle. I felt so relaxed being with them. ..."

She was able to visit the Human Rights Museum, The Forks, Fort Whyte, and Ikea, and shop for souvenirs, as well as attending the workshop, so it was a busy few days. She left for home on the Tuesday after the weekend. Here are a few more words from the letter mentioned above.

"... [You] kindly introduced me to your Winnipeg members. They are kind and openhearted to me. ... Please give my best regards to your wonderful Winnipeg Branch members. ..."

Mina Corson

We are saddened to learn of the passing of an icon of the RSCDS. Mina Corson passed away in Edinburgh, Scotland, at the age of 101 years. She was a Phys Ed teacher and Scottish Country Dance was a requirement at that time. Mina joined the RSCDS and became a teacher, tutor, and examiner. Mina taught internationally. Her niece mentioned that she had travelled to many places, including South Africa and Winnipeg.

Mina's first trip to Winnipeg was as an examiner for the Candidate class of 1969. (Monique Henderson, Shirley Taylor, and Bill Young) This was the beginning of Mina's connection with the Winnipeg Branch. Over the years Mina taught at several Winnipeg workshops, including the Branch 25th Anniversary Celebration in 1983.

For many years Mina was the Winnipeg Branch representative to Headquarters. This service was recognised with the award of an Honourary Life Membership in the Winnipeg Branch. Eventually, she had to step down from this position but still kept in touch with the Branch. For "special events", Mina would send a donation for "something special".

Mina had been in a care home for a while now. In the pictures of her 100th Birthday Party, Mina looked the same as ever – bright eyed and a big smile.
